On September 9th, we launched our Sunday Morning Small Group meetings with a sum of 50 people participating in four different groups. FROM THE PASTOR

TRANSITION

For the last four years, it's been my joy and honor to serve as your pastor. On Oct 1st, I will begin my new position with Lutheran Hour Ministries (LHM), a global outreach organization that's been serving Jesus for almost 90 years. LHM exists to equip Christian lay people for local outreach and to provide expanded global outreach through broadcast media (radio, internet, satellite tv, and print). LHM currently reaches 100 million people around the world each week with the Good News of Jesus. "Christ to the Nations – and the Nations to the Church" is their motto. Learn more at Ihm.org. With the recommendation of the Missouri District, Epiphany's Board of Elders has elected Pastor Max Biesenthal to serve as our part-time vacancy pastor. He has over 40 years' experience as a pastor and church leader. We are grateful for Max's eagerness to serve as we begin the prayerful process to call a new full-time pastor. To get to know him, we asked Pastor Biesenthal a few questions:

What are some of your favorite features of St Louis?

After living in Chicago and Seattle for the 25 years prior to moving to St Louis, I find St Louis to be an easy city. Traffic is tolerable, the roads are good, even the parking spots are big (Seattle's are tiny). And I love the parks – each neighborhood seems to be anchored by a park. Forest Park is an absolute jewel.

And I love Octobers. I also appreciate the fact that St Louis is centered between our five grandchildren – three in Chicago and two in Northwest Arkansas.

What are some important lessons you've learned from prior work experience?

The thing I have learned in every work opportunity is that God is never finished with me. Life is a journey, and we learn along the way, and everything we experience – good, bad or ugly – prepares us for what comes next. I have been in small churches and very large churches; faith-based institutions and corporations; entrepreneurial endeavors and free-lance engagements; sales and marketing. And in each instance, I have learned to take God seriously, and myself less so.

When you have a day off, what do you like to do?

My hobbies are gardening (flowers and plants, not vegetables); golf; sports of any flavor (I'm a Detroit boy – so go Red Wings!!); reading; and I have a Jigsaw puzzle app on my iPad that provides great relaxation.

Thinking about your childhood church, what memories stand out?

I think about my pastor, who happened to be my Dad. Difficult as it is sometimes to be a PK [preacher's kid], the memories are all warm.

LIVING IN THE NAME

I'll go ahead and leave out the explicit voting details, but the highlights for myself were the messages from the guest essayist, Dr. Adam S. Francisco, and the message from our LCMS President, Rev. Dr. Matthew Harrison.

Dr. Francisco is mostly an academic historian by trade, but as he spoke, it became apparent that he was really a deep lover of Jesus and His Word and Truth. Speaking from topics such as apologetics, history, and the changing landscape of philosophy in our times, he was able to encourage us in our pursuits of truth and spreading Jesus' love to all people in our different contexts. I would encourage anyone to check out some of his talks from the convention or at least to read some of the works he has published.

Probably the focal point of our Monday was President Harrison's speech. He was currently traveling, visiting many conventions around the country, and he has been promoting a theme "Joy:Fully Lutheran". Early on in his message, he spoke of how the words 'joy' and 'grace' have the same root (hara) in the Greek language. This point captured me, since I have a daughter whose name means joy, and her mother's name means grace! I had to pay deep attention at this point, this message is already hitting home!

As he spoke to a room of regional pastors and lay people from different backgrounds, he was able to speak to specific issues and challenges we as a church and denomination are facing. As expected, he was encouraging in ways that our many churches are overcoming those challenges today, and how we look to overcome them in the future. But what I personally took away from this talk is that this point of being Joy:Fully Lutheran is less about overcoming challenges, and more about living out our identity as a church and what's important for us to hold onto.

The good news is that as we look forward as a large denomination, and even for small yet mighty local church at Epiphany, we are able to hold onto our identity in Christ, and the hope of what it is to come. Even as we move into the future with some uncertainty, we still are able to be bursting with joy.

If someone was to visit our church, and they would ask, "how is it that you all are so happy and full of hope?" I hope that we could reply, "Well, it's because of Jesus, it's in His name that we find Joy!"

FIRING ON FOUR CYLINDERS

Driving on a mis-firing cylinder is dangerous. The cylinder is the spot in your car's engine where internal combustion takes place. This is the source of your car's power—the torque that turns your wheels. A mid-size car normally has four cylinders. If one isn't firing, why can't you just get along with three? Well, that's like a horse running on three legs. Also, if you have a problem with one cylinder, it's likely to lead to problems with the others. If you've got a bad cylinder, you need to get it fixed right away.

The Christian's life is like a car powered by four cylinders. The Bible reveals four sources of power to become and remain a faithful follower of Jesus (1) receiving baptism and returning to its promises; (2) participating in the Lord's Supper; (3) listening to preaching; and (4) Christ-centered conversation with brothers and sisters in the faith.



Just like the four cylinders in your car all run on the same fuel, so also with the four cylinders of faith: God's Word powers them all. So, why four? Why not just one? A four-cylinder engine provides for ideal balance, torque, and efficiency. In a similar way, God wants His Word to power our faith in four ways, not just one. The first three—Baptism, Lord's Supper, and Preaching happen in the larger gatherings of the church. Many Christians think these are enough. But God designed us to run on all four. That last one—Christ-centered conversations with brothers and sisters in the faith—is as needful as the others. Talking with other Christians about Jesus and His work in our lives gives us the extra boost we need to speak of Him with our neighbors and joyfully live for Him in our schools, jobs, and neighborhoods. Faith, powered by the Word, drives us into God's world!

Is this the fourth cylinder you've been missing? Gathering in a smaller group with other Christ-followers is the answer. If you couldn't commit to one of Epiphany's groups this Fall, look for more opportunities in the near future.

What have been some difficulties in adapting to life at seminary?

But at the same time, it's great to learn from brilliant professors and leaders, and there is a unique community that exists for families at the seminary.

We love how accessible St. Louis is- we are so close to so many great museums, the Zoo, Science Center, parks, in fact, our biggest problem is finding enough time for it all. We love living in a city, and it's amazing how many free and family-friendly options there are in and around St. Louis. Why were you interested in serving as a field worker at Epiphany?
