## THE COMMUNITY WITHIN THE COMMUNITY

Perhaps you're familiar with an old song – 50 years old already. 'Windmills of Your Mind'. The song is written by Alan and Marilyn Bergman with music by Michael Legrand, and was part of the score of the Thomas Crown Affair. The words are somewhat vague with almost a psychedelic feel, and since the song was created in the 60s, there is reason for that.

Part of the repeating lyric is the phrase 'wheel within a wheel'. And while we think of Ezekiel's flying wheel, the application to Epiphany and the community is obvious. We are a community within a community. Epiphany is a community of believers who live and move and serve and love within a specific geographic neighborhood and cultural community.

One of (but not the only) the primary reasons a community of believers invests in the community in which it is located is stewardship. Way back in the Garden, Adam and Eve were commissioned to have dominion over creation – meaning they were to steward it for good. They were to invest themselves in creation and ensure that it was healthy and thriving. That commission still exists. We as believers are to steward creation – investing ourselves in our community ensuring it is healthy and strong. We do that not only as a means to share the Gospel (although that is another primary reason for stewarding community), but because that's who we are and what we are to be about.

That's where the community within the community comes into play. We are, in the words of Hebrew 10, to spur one another to good works (the Greek has the sense of 'provoking' each other). We gather as a community of believers celebrating the cross, and as we gather, we encourage each other to be about the business of stewarding creation – investing in community.

Sometimes we get distracted by the bottom line – we want to know the return on our investment – how many people have been brought to Epiphany because of our community service?

It's the wrong focus. Of course, we want to share the Gospel. But as a community within a community we invest ourselves in our neighborhood because that's what we are called and commissioned to do, happily loving and serving with those around us to create a 'garden' of peace and love.

It's time for the church to be turned inside out – we don't escape from the community to be a community. We gather as a community redeemed by the cross to serve the community in which we find ourselves, 'provoking' each other to loving and serving in all we do.

A wheel within a wheel. A community within a community. For good.




You are a warm, loving genuine group of people. I would say that Karen and I have felt more 'connected' here than anywhere we have been over the last years. Thank you for that.




## THE FOUNDATIONS OF COMMUNITY






- 1. Religious people are too judgmental.

### **COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP**

When I first came to Epiphany with my family as simply a visitor, Pastor Zeigler introduced himself to us as we were leaving the church. We had recently moved to the neighborhood, and Ana was about six months pregnant at the time. Our three main requirements for a church were, that they believe in the Bible, that they at least acknowledge the fact that they are next door to a public school, and that they have a heart for the immediate neighborhood around them.



As he talked to us, he let us know that membership was not the only way we could have a feeling of inclusion in the church (we eventually

became members, and I now work for the church). He said it was important that we also know how we can simply be partners or neighbors. With Pastor Z acknowledging that it was important that we be partners, it shifted the focus away from solely being about his role as a Pastor, or how great Epiphany is, but to something even better, a relationship between people. If I was to define partnership, I would define it as "a relationship between two parties working together towards a common goal".

I believe that God calls us to partner with Him, and actively participate in His big Kingdom mission for the world. He also calls us to partner with others to work together as a community of believers. As a new-ish role as a Community Partnership Director, I would say my main objective, is to have people experience the same feeling I had walking out of Epiphany the first time I visited, recognizing that God was at work, and His love was being expressed through the mission of the church.

I'll be starting some brief workshops to help all our members in our journey to be "a community of partners." We'll simply take time to get to know each other better as church members, and then we will have some practical time to see how we can live that out in our lives, no matter where we are at in our journey.
