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FOR THE LOVE OF THE GAME...AND THE CHURCH

I'm an adult convert—not to the church, but to baseball. Growing up in a place where the only spectator sport in the entire state was collegiate football, I grew up without baseball. Indeed, for the first half of my life, I harbored a degree of animus toward the utterly "boring" sport. Then I moved to St. Louis, and oddly found myself keeping Jack Buck turned on when driving around town. From there it was only a matter of time as I was gradually but inevitably transformed into a legitimate citizen of Cardinal Nation. Of course, the conversion did not happen overnight. Not only did it take time, it took a good deal of learning and doing.

The parallels between cultivating an appreciation for baseball (complete with a renunciation of both the designated hitter and the Cubs) and learning to be a part of the church are actually quite striking. There is an entire community and culture of baseball that one must grow to understand and value for its own sake. People who grasp it call it a "respect for the game" or "honoring the tradition". It's quite telling, by the way, that one rarely hears such phrases when other sports are discussed. Far older, more refined, and sacred are the gifts, narratives, and practices that have been granted to the church and that have been carefully cultivated and cherished by generation after generation of believers. Yet, how strange that some people seem more concerned about maintaining the integrity and honor of baseball than they are about preserving the church's distinctive teachings and heritage.

The lessons to be learned using baseball as a living illustration are many. Together, we have been tasked with the work of sharing God's truth with one another and with the world around us. This should be the focus of all that we do in our daily lives. Being shaped and formed into one of God's people is a life-long process—both for ourselves and for those we are working to shape. Be deliberate about the work; there is a genuine joy and delight in doing it, and much more is at stake than merely keeping the designated hitter out of National League ballparks.

ARMISTICE DAY



The eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month—and so, after four years of horrific suffering and bloodshed, it ended: the “war to end all wars.” The armistice that ended World War I was 101 years ago and has been widely celebrated ever since...even if the optimism that came with the end of that world war was soon snuffed out by another world-engulfing war, and then countless successive wars that have been less sweeping, but no less devastating to those caught up in the conflict. In our own country, the annual observance of November 11th has shifted from a focus on the Great War to include all who have served in the US armed forces living or dead. It’s good to remember, honor, and appreciate those veterans who have sacrificed in ways small and great for the sake of their fellow citizens. We should all be grateful for what they have done for us. But, it’s also good to remember the first sentiments of Armistice Day—a celebration of peace attained, and a recommitment to work for and extend peace in the world.

As Christians, we know that even as peace among peoples and nations is pursued, it will never be achieved, not fully. Human sin and evil will always thrust people and nations into conflict that will too easily and often erupt into violence on a large scale. While we rightly pray and work for an end to violence and war, we who follow Christ know very well that the only source of true and enduring peace in this world must come from outside the world. It can only be received as a gift through faith in Christ. The wonderful reality for Christians is that we know and share with others real peace right now. This is no small thing, of course. In a world torn by strife, self-assertion, insistence on personal rights, and disputes about what is or is not just, conflict is inevitable. So, when God speaks His peace into a life, this is an extraordinary gift. Christians know that gift, and Christians then bring that gift into the lives of those they meet.

The giving of God’s peace in Christ takes on many forms in words and in actions, and is always transformative for both the giver and the receiver. And whatever shape it takes, at its core God’s peace is the same, simple thing: the message of forgiveness and newness in Christ. That’s the peace we have and share each week in worship. And, that’s the peace that we deliberately and tirelessly take out into the streets and homes and lives of those around Epiphany, in our neighborhoods, and in our friendships. The peace we have in Christ deserves to be celebrated and shared because it never fails. Share it on Sunday. Share it all week long in your daily life.

REFLECTIONS FROM THE LCMS NATIONAL CONVENTION IN TAMPA THIS SUMMER

In July, I attended the LCMS National Convention in Tampa, FL. Most of the convention involves parliamentary procedures, so essentially a lot of debating and a whole lot of voting. There were actually so many things to vote on, that we did not even get to finish up the business! (And I was there for five days working from 8am-6pm!) All the outcomes of voting and resolutions are available online, and if you are really interested, you can watch the convention on a website such as YouTube. It's basically like watching Lutheran C-Span but with some good music and liturgy here and there.



Most of the convention is set up to be rather straightforward as the Floor Committees generally work to have the resolutions be easily voted on and established without too much debate, with only minor changes to the resolution. Sometimes, a few resolutions lead to lengthy debate and rather high emotions. Some things would be debated on for so long, that they would have to be postponed to another day! After five days of this, I will admit, it is more of a marathon rather than a sprint, and I found myself pretty drained!

If you had asked me how I felt about things that week, I would have probably given a rather bleak report. I would have probably mentioned all the moments of concern about our denomination moving forward, such as the growing need for Pastors in the future, the tricky path for the Concordia University System in an academic climate that is increasingly hostile to a bold witness of a Lutheran identity, or what is the proper church response to a migrant and refugee crisis that is becoming polarizing in our civic sphere. Now that I am a few months removed from the week, I find myself realizing that all this debate is because people care deeply about their local church, and the synod at large.

It's fascinating to think that a few centuries ago, a few people from multiple local churches could form a synod that would grow to include tens of thousands of churches, with millions of people, numerous schools, and plenty of affiliated organizations. While I cannot say that all these schools and organizations and even some churches will survive, it's encouraging to think about how far we have gotten, and remember that in the midst of many changes over time, we still have the freedom to worship and proclaim the gospel of Jesus in our different contexts and communities around the world.

I love how much the story of Epiphany mirrors the story of so many churches in our Synod! So many churches started in small gathering places, then over time, created the larger spaces for worship and gathering and community events. Now, many churches including Epiphany have to deal with new issues that are unfamiliar and concerning, and honestly, not many people have answers on how things will go in the future. However, I think it's important to remember how much God has worked through our church in the past, and how we can pray that we are able to boldly follow his call as a congregation and community in the future. I'm thankful that I could go to a convention and be around many LCMS churches and organizations that are working through these issues together. I believe that our Church and our Synod must continue to embrace the messiness of working through tough issues so we can maintain our identity as a body of believers representing Christ to the world in the future.


FOUNDATIONS 2019 RECAP

What a blessing it is to see God's people come together in community, outreach, and nurturing the development of our young people. That is an important takeaway from "Foundations" in 2019. Throughout the month of September, over 50 people took part in our 4-week event- student and adult volunteers worked together, and students and parents from our church and community gathered to make new friends, learn new skills, and witness what life together looks like in the church.

Our parent classes focused on helping parents navigate the challenges of raising kids in the 21st Century, with a variety of educators bringing years of experience to the table. It also created space for parents to ask tough questions and find support from one another. Our kids classes provided 4 exciting opportunities for kids: "Geoplunge", where students learned about U.S. geography in a fun, competitive game; "Chess", where new and experienced players had an opportunity to play and meet new friends; "Be Your Own Superhero", an opportunity for students to create their own Super Hero from scratch, using their imagination, and actually making comic books with their friends; and "Doing Good Together", where students provided care and support for others in need, making cards for children with long-term illness, cat toys for pets in shelters, and Forever Flowers for nursing home residents.

Perhaps the best moment at Foundations is our meal time, when kids, parents, and caring teens and adults sit down to eat together. In our fast-paced world, these meals become a blessing for families and a significant space for our relationship-building. We are grateful to all of our volunteers who made Foundations possible this year, cooking and serving meals, administration and registration, working with kids and parents, we could not have done this without you all. 


